I. <u>Graduating Student Inventory</u> - This section presents summary data of indirect measures of institutional learning outcomes as indicated in the **Graduating Student Inventory**. The stem for this section reads, "Are these areas of personal growth stronger or weaker than when you began your education?" (*Much weaker* = 1; *Much stronger* = 5) The performance standard for this learning outcome assessment is a total aggregate score of 4.0/80% (minimum score for "successful") and 4.5/90% (minimum score for "excellent").
